Polish President Karol Nawrocki to Visit Washington in Early September

Poland's newly sworn-in President Karol Nawrocki is scheduled to meet with U.S. President Donald Trump in Washington, D.C., on September 3, 2025. The invitation was confirmed by Pawel Szefernaker, the chief of Nawrocki's cabinet, highlighting the continued importance of strong bilateral relations between Poland and the United States.

Nawrocki officially took office as Poland's president on August 7, 2025. His rise to the presidency was supported by the Law and Justice party (PiS), Poland's primary nationalist opposition group. Nawrocki has consistently emphasized the strategic value of the Polish-American partnership, particularly in matters of security and economic cooperation.

Prior to the Polish presidential election held in May, Nawrocki met with Trump at the White House's Oval Office. During this meeting, the U.S. president expressed his support for Nawrocki's candidacy. This backing was seen as a significant boost ahead of the election.

On the day of Nawrocki's inauguration, President Trump sent an official congratulatory letter that included an invitation to a working meeting in Washington. According to Szefernaker's statement on the social media platform X (formerly Twitter), the meeting is intended to strengthen cooperation and discuss shared interests.

The visit marks an early opportunity for both leaders to set the tone for future collaboration on a range of issues including defense, trade, and regional security. Poland, a key member of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO), has sought to deepen ties with the United States as part of its foreign policy strategy in a complex geopolitical environment.

This upcoming meeting follows a trend of closer engagement between Poland and the U.S., reflecting mutual interests and shared values. Observers note that Nawrocki's presidency could reinforce Poland's role as a critical ally in Eastern Europe.

The meeting between the two presidents is expected to cover a broad agenda, underscoring the significance of the transatlantic alliance. As the situation in Europe continues to evolve, Washington and Warsaw remain committed to maintaining a strong partnership.
