

## Australia Responds to Netanyahu as Diplomatic Tensions Over Gaza Rise

Australia has responded firmly to Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu's recent criticism, escalating a diplomatic dispute over Canberra's stance on Gaza and Palestine. The tensions follow Australia's announcement that it plans to recognize a Palestinian state, a decision that Netanyahu described as a betrayal and labeled the government's position as weak.

The row intensified when Israel revoked visas for Australian diplomats accredited to the Palestinian Authority. The action was seen as retaliation for Canberra's denial of entry to far-right Israeli lawmaker Simcha Rothman, known for making incendiary remarks. Australia's government has defended its position, emphasizing that foreign policy decisions are guided by moral and ethical considerations rather than political pressure.

Prime Minister Anthony Albanese sought to de-escalate rhetoric while affirming Australia's sovereign right to engage independently in international affairs. He noted that Canberra had communicated its plans to recognize Palestine directly to Netanyahu prior to the announcement, reinforcing that the move is a matter of principle and does not constitute hostility toward Israel. Albanese emphasized that the government's foreign policy decisions are shaped by a commitment to human rights and long-term regional stability.

Home Affairs Minister Tony Burke addressed the visa denial, defending it as a necessary measure against individuals promoting bigotry. "Strength is not measured by violence but by principled stances," Burke said, framing Australia's actions as guided by moral conviction. His comments directly countered Netanyahu's characterization of Australian policy as weak, underlining Canberra's determination to act in accordance with its values.

The dispute has attracted domestic attention, with prominent voices within Australia, including members of the Jewish community, warning that Netanyahu's rhetoric could inflame tensions and contribute to antisemitism. Commentators noted that the criticism reflects broader shifts in international opinion, as countries such as France, Canada, and the UK have also taken steps toward recognizing Palestine.

While the diplomatic dispute has strained relations, Australia has signaled that it seeks to maintain constructive engagement with Israel. Officials stressed that the recognition of Palestine would be implemented under conditions that include assurances of demilitarization and inclusive governance, aiming to promote stability and peace rather than exacerbate conflict.

The developments come amid rising humanitarian concerns in Gaza, where ongoing violence has resulted in significant civilian casualties. Australia's decision to advance recognition of Palestine is framed as part of a broader international effort to encourage a viable two-state solution, balancing moral obligations with geopolitical considerations.

Analysts note that the situation highlights Australia's willingness to assert an independent foreign policy, prioritizing ethical considerations and human rights over appeasement or diplomatic expediency. The government's approach demonstrates a commitment to maintaining its principles, even when faced with criticism from key international partners.

As diplomatic discussions continue, Australia's actions underscore a careful balance: engaging with Israel while advocating for Palestinian self-determination and a peaceful resolution to the ongoing conflict. Canberra's strategy reflects a broader trend among Western democracies seeking to mediate in the Middle East based on international norms and humanitarian priorities, rather than unilateral alignment.
