## Ferguson Steps In After Royal Lionesses Oversight

Sarah Ferguson, Duchess of York, has stepped in to address a noticeable omission in King Charles III's tribute to England's national women's football team, the Lionesses, following their UEFA Women's Euro 2025 triumph. Her public acknowledgement of rising star Michelle Agyemang came after fans criticised the King's failure to mention the young player in his congratulatory message.

After England's historic victory over Spain in a nail-biting penalty shootout in Basel, the Royal Family issued a message from King Charles III commending the team for their "remarkable" performance and "inspiring" journey. However, the message failed to mention Michelle Agyemang, a key contributor to the win. The oversight quickly caught the attention of fans online, many of whom pointed out the glaring omission of the 19-year-old player.

In response, the Duchess of York took to social media to offer her message of praise. "Michelle Agyemang and Chloe Kelly, wow," she wrote, adding that the team's unity and determination were "incredible" and "inspirational." She continued, "You show such bravery and courage... It's just extraordinary. Good luck tomorrow. It's just exciting to watch." Her comments quickly gained traction as supporters welcomed her recognition of the full squad's efforts.

The match itself was a dramatic affair, with England battling back from a goal down to defeat Spain in a tense penalty shootout. The Union of European Football Associations (UEFA) championship victory cements the Lionesses' place among England's greatest sporting achievements. The Football Association (FA) has announced a celebratory homecoming event in central London, with an open-top bus parade and a trophy ceremony scheduled for Tuesday afternoon.

The parade will travel along The Mall and culminate at the Queen Victoria Memorial in front of Buckingham Palace, with coverage airing live between 12 p.m. and 1 p.m. across the British Broadcasting Corporation (BBC), Independent Television (ITV), and Sky News. Hosted by sports broadcaster Alex Scott, the event will feature performances by the Band of His Majesty's Royal Marines Portsmouth, the Central Band of the Royal Air Force, and live music from DJ CharStape.

The recognition from the Duchess highlights the significance of individual contributions within team success and the importance of giving rising talent like Agyemang their due. As England celebrates the Lionesses' championship, the public's enthusiasm underscores the strong support for homegrown athletes who inspire through grit, discipline, and national pride.
