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## Top Business Leaders Meet Field Marshal Asim Munir to Address Pakistan's Economic Future

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A high level delegation of Pakistan's top business figures, led by former caretaker federal minister Gohar Ejaz, held strategic discussions with Field Marshal Asim Munir on Monday to review Pakistan's current economic outlook and chart a path forward for much needed reforms. Field Marshal Munir's outreach may mark a turning point in the country's economic strategy where economic competence, not political expediency, becomes the core driving force. For Pakistan to break free from cycles of crisis and dependency, this alliance between strategic leadership and enterprise must be nurtured and empowered with a clear and actionable roadmap.
