Those who prefer staying on land can enjoy the popular two-hour walking route to the Rubha nan Gall Lighthouse. The coastal path weaves through lush greenery and provides dramatic views over the Sound of Mull. It captures the raw beauty of the Hebridean landscape, making it a favourite for photographers and walkers alike.

Back in the heart of the town, Tobermory also boasts a rich whisky heritage that predates most modern tourist attractions. The Tobermory Distillery, established in 1798, continues to produce some of the region's finest single malts. With its long legacy and intimate tours, the distillery draws whisky enthusiasts eager to learn about centuries of craftsmanship. Tastings are a key highlight, particularly the celebrated 12-year-old expression that proudly bears the town's name.

As domestic travel continues to rise and more families consider life away from congested cities, places like Tobermory are being looked at with fresh eyes. Property interest in the region has increased, with buyers attracted by the town's mix of coastal charm, vibrant community, and promising long-term appeal. The desire for homes with character, heritage, and access to nature has helped shine a light on rural spots often overlooked by developers.
