## New EU Proposal Could Guarantee Two Free Cabin Bags for Airline Passengers

Airline passengers could soon benefit from a major change in European travel regulations, as lawmakers move closer to approving rules that would allow travellers to carry two pieces of hand luggage on board free of charge. The proposed law, which has gained traction in the European Parliament, is aimed at improving transparency and fairness for

consumers, particularly those frustrated by inconsistent and often costly baggage policies across different carriers.

Currently, many low-cost airlines charge extra for cabin baggage beyond a small personal item, leading to confusion and complaints from passengers who feel misled by seemingly low base fares. The new rules would seek to standardise what passengers are entitled to bring on board, making clear that one larger carry-on bag and one smaller personal item, such as a handbag or laptop case, should be included in the ticket price.

The initiative follows growing calls from consumer groups and regulators to end what some see as unfair or misleading pricing tactics. Lawmakers argue that clearer baggage policies would not only help passengers plan better but also foster greater competition between airlines on the quality of service, rather than relying on hidden fees to drive profits.

Supporters of the reform say it reflects the evolving nature of air travel, where passengers increasingly expect straightforward, transparent pricing, especially on short-haul and budget routes. The proposal also includes measures to improve access to flight information and ensure better coordination across European airspace, aiming to reduce delays and improve efficiency.

While the changes are still subject to further approval and coordination with EU member states, the momentum behind the bill suggests a shift in how airline consumer rights are being approached. If adopted, the rules would apply to flights within the EU, potentially influencing broader industry standards, even for non-EU carriers operating in the region.

For travellers, the prospect of bringing two bags on board without extra charges may soon become more than just wishful thinking; it could be part of a new baseline for air travel across Europe.
