

Trump Expresses Frustration Over Slow India Trade Talks, White House Aide Reveals



Former President Donald Trump has expressed growing frustration with ongoing trade negotiations between the United States and India, according to a statement made by a senior White House aide earlier this week. The comments highlight continuing challenges in reaching a comprehensive trade deal with India, which has long been a key economic partner for the U.S. in Asia.

The aide, who spoke on condition of anonymity, explained that Trump is increasingly dissatisfied with the pace and lack of progress in the discussions, particularly as both countries face economic pressures and geopolitical uncertainties.
