The peninsula also offers access to scenic walking routes, including a nine-mile stretch to Hengistbury Head and shorter walks to Canford Cliffs and Bournemouth.

A short ferry ride costing just £1 return leads to Shell Bay and further on to Old Harry Rocks, offering a quieter alternative with picturesque scenery. The less-crowded beaches along this route give visitors a chance to enjoy the coastal surroundings away from the buzz of the main beach.

Sandbanks may no longer be the best-kept secret it once was, but it remains one of Britain's most distinctive and desirable seaside destinations. With its award-winning sandy beaches and stunning coastal walks, it offers all the hallmarks of a luxury holiday without the need to

leave the country. While the increased popularity has brought a higher price tag and busier weekends, the area's natural beauty and unique charm continue to justify the attention.
