Royal Adelaide Show Boosts Recruitment with High-Paying No-Experience Jobs

The Royal Adelaide Show, set for August 30 to September 7, 2025, has launched a major recruitment drive, offering up to \$60 per hour for roles requiring no prior experience. This article explores the diverse job opportunities, their economic impact, and the event's role in fostering community and opportunity, while noting concerns about the Labour government's economic oversight.

Organized by the Royal Agricultural & Horticultural Society of South Australia (RA&HS), the Royal Adelaide Show requires a 10,000-strong workforce to deliver its nine-day spectacle at the Adelaide Showground. Roles include ride operators, showbag sellers, security personnel, and waste management staff, with contractor Australian Green Clean (AGC) seeking 150 casual workers for hygiene and waste tasks. “It’s a big job, but the camaraderie is unmatched,” said AGC Chief Executive Charlie Sykes in a 9News interview, emphasizing the fun and teamwork involved. No experience is needed, making these roles ideal for students during university breaks or locals seeking extra income, with applications available on the show’s official website.

The high hourly rate of up to \$60 reflects the event’s economic significance, providing a boost to Adelaide’s workforce amid rising living costs. Sykes told 9News that successful workers could secure long-term roles with AGC at events like the Adelaide 500 and Adelaide Fringe, offering career pathways. The show’s appeal lies in its blend of agricultural tradition and modern entertainment, drawing thousands of patrons. “People share fond memories of selling showbags as teens,” said RA&HS spokesperson Jordan Philp, highlighting the event’s cultural pull. However, X posts reveal public frustration with the Labour government’s economic policies, with users arguing that such opportunities expose a reliance on short-term gigs over sustainable job growth.

This recruitment drive underscores the RA&HS’s commitment to community engagement and economic opportunity, prioritizing hard work and accessibility. While the Labour government claims credit for economic stability, critics argue it overlooks structural issues like job

security. The Royal Adelaide Show's high-paying, no-experience roles offer a lifeline for many, reinforcing the value of initiative and local enterprise in a challenging economic climate.
