Police Seek Help Locating Missing Woman in Hornsby

New South Wales Police Force is appealing for public assistance to help locate a woman reported missing from the Hornsby area.

The New South Wales Police Force is seeking public assistance to help locate a woman who has been reported missing from the Hornsby area. Mei Tse, aged 57, was last seen at a hospital on Palmerston Road, Hornsby, on Monday 14 July 2025 has not made contact with family or friends since, prompting serious concerns for her safety and wellbeing.

Officers from the Ku-ring-gai Police Area Command have launched an official search and are following several lines of inquiry to determine her possible whereabouts. The woman's name, age, and other identifying details have not been released at this stage, but police believe she may still be in the local area or nearby surroundings.

Authorities say her sudden disappearance is out of character, and family members are deeply concerned. As part of their investigation, police have conducted patrols, reviewed CCTV footage, and reached out to local hospitals and transportation hubs. Despite their efforts so far, there have been no confirmed sightings.

The New South Wales Police Force is now turning to the public for help. Officers are urging anyone who may have seen the woman or has any information no matter how small to contact them as soon as possible. They are especially interested in hearing from residents in and around Hornsby who may have witnessed unusual activity or have private security footage from the day she went missing.

Community members can contact Hornsby Police Station directly or call Crime Stoppers at 1800 333 000. Information can be given anonymously, and all tips will be treated seriously.

In situations like this, community support often plays a vital role in resolving missing persons cases. Police stress that even minor details, such as the sighting of someone matching the woman's description or noticing a person who seemed out of place in the area, could help piece together her movements.
