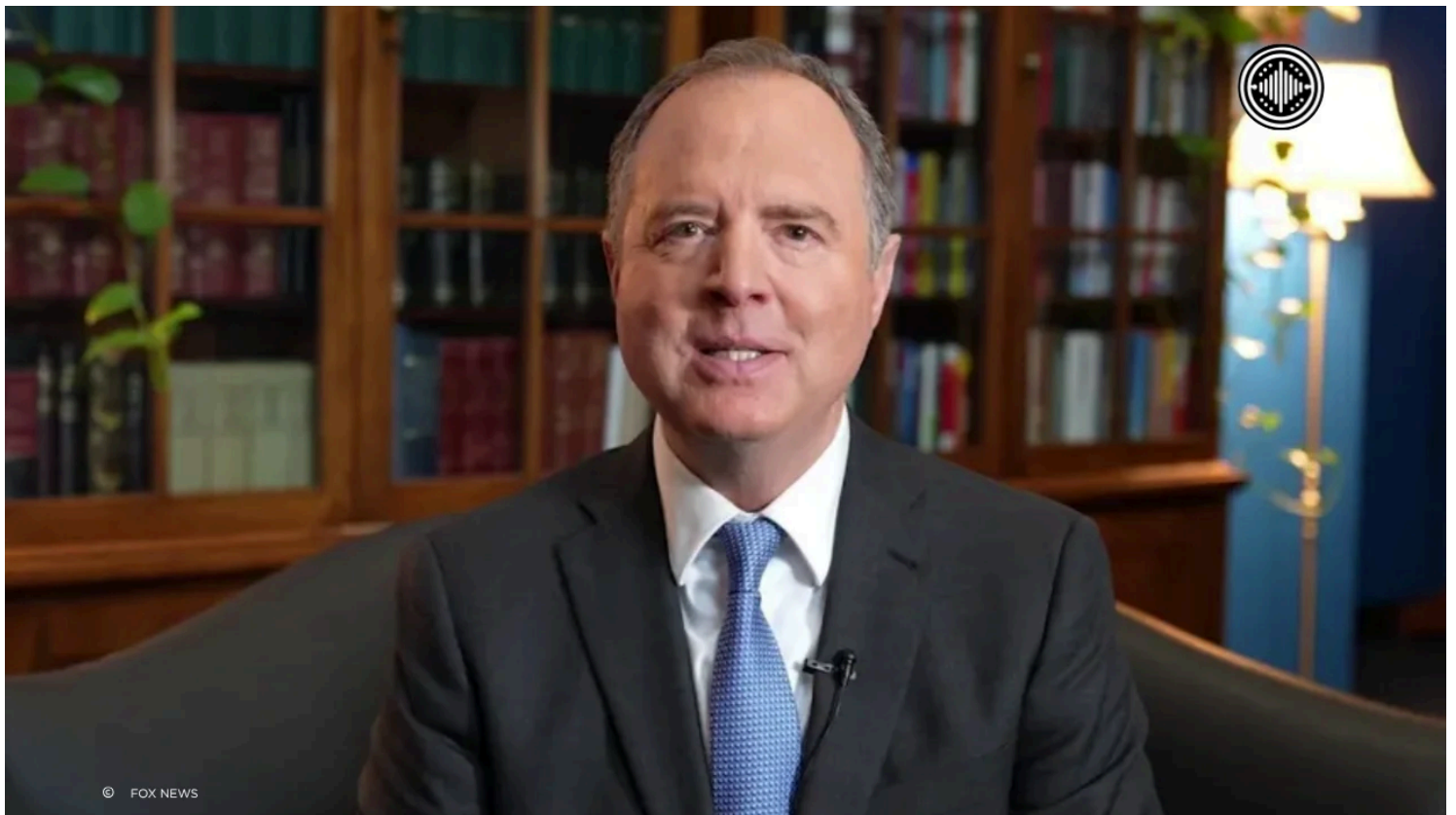


Trump Demands Legal Action Against Schiff Over Alleged Mortgage Fraud

Donald Trump has called for Democratic Senator Adam Schiff to face legal consequences over allegations of mortgage fraud. Speaking publicly and through his Truth Social platform, Trump claimed Schiff falsely listed a Maryland property as his primary residence from 2009 to 2020 to qualify for lower mortgage rates. According to Trump, the

arrangement was flagged by Fannie Mae as potential fraud and referred to the Department of Justice for review.

He described Schiff as “Crooked Adam Schiff” and insisted that the allegations warranted prosecution. The accusation marks another chapter in the ongoing feud between the two, stemming from Schiff’s role in Trump’s impeachment proceedings and continued criticism of his policies.

Senator Schiff has denied any misconduct. He stated that his mortgage lenders were aware of his bi-coastal living arrangements, which include residences in both California and the Washington, D.C. area, common among members of Congress. Schiff called the allegations baseless and politically motivated.

As of now, neither the Department of Justice, Fannie Mae, nor the Federal Housing Finance Agency has confirmed any active investigation. Legal analysts note that while mortgage fraud is a serious accusation, the timing and political context raise questions about whether the claim is more strategic than legal in nature.

This latest dispute highlights a broader trend of public officials being accused of wrongdoing through political channels rather than legal processes. Trump has previously made similar allegations against other Democratic figures, often framing such claims as efforts to hold political opponents accountable.

Supporters argue that pursuing fraud claims, regardless of political implications, reflects a commitment to equal enforcement of the law.

Critics warn, however, that using unproven allegations to tarnish rivals sets a dangerous precedent and undermines institutional integrity.

With the political landscape becoming increasingly confrontational ahead of the 2026 elections, episodes like this underscore the deepening rift between partisan camps. Whether these accusations lead to formal charges or fade as political theater remains to be seen, but the underlying tone suggests a growing readiness to use legal threats as campaign weapons.
