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Alleged \$270K Hit on Sydney Underworld Figure

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Explosive court revelations have detailed a \$270,000 alleged payment for the murder of Sydney underworld figure Bilal Hamze, with prosecutors claiming a man connected to the rival Alameddine crime family was the intended recipient. The sensational disclosure emerged during committal proceedings for a suspect accused of orchestrating both Hamze's 2021 execution and a foiled plot against his brother Ibrahem. These

developments expose the brutal economics of Sydney's gangland warfare.

Court documents outline a meticulously planned assassination, with the accused allegedly contracting the hit through intermediaries. Prosecutors assert the six-figure sum reflects the high-stakes nature of Sydney's criminal power struggles, where personal vendettas and territorial disputes frequently turn violent. The Hamze-Alameddine feud has claimed multiple lives in recent years, with law enforcement struggling to contain the bloodshed despite dedicated task forces and increased surveillance.



Legal analysts note the case highlights worrying gaps in witness protection programs, with key informants reportedly reluctant to testify despite compelling evidence. This reluctance underscores the pervasive climate of fear within organized crime circles, where retribution against "cooperators" remains an ever-present threat. Police sources acknowledge the challenges of securing convictions when intimidation silences potential witnesses.

As the case progresses, it serves as a stark reminder of organized crime's corrosive influence on urban communities. Beyond the headline-grabbing violence, these networks perpetuate drug epidemics, money laundering, and youth exploitation. While prosecutors work to dismantle these groups, the persistence of such brazen contract killings raises troubling questions about the effectiveness of current countermeasures. One thing remains clear: until the rule of law triumphs over gangland justice, Sydney's streets will continue bearing witness to this deadly reckoning.
