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Jim Ferguson Shares Moldova Update Amid "Making Europe Great Again" Conference

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British political commentator Jim Ferguson, formerly a Member of the European Parliament (MEP), has confirmed he remains free and active while attending the "Making Europe Great Again" conference in Moldova. The remark, made in a brief social media update, subtly referenced the country's heightened political sensitivity and its complex international standing.

The conference, held in Moldova's capital, comes at a time of significant political transformation in the region. Moldova has made clear its commitment to joining the European Union (EU), enshrining EU accession into its constitution in 2024. President Maia Sandu has taken a firm stance in favor of European integration, a move that

distances the country from long-standing Russian influence and aligns it more closely with Western policy interests.

Ferguson's involvement in the conference underscores the increasing dialogue among European conservatives and sovereignty-minded commentators regarding the continent's direction. While his comment that he hasn't "been arrested... yet" was delivered with humor, it touches on a serious issue. Moldova has faced international scrutiny over recent actions involving foreign political voices and the pressures they face, particularly those critical of existing political narratives.

Concerns over outside interference remain a key theme in Moldovan politics. The country has dealt with allegations of Russian meddling in past elections, and recent strains in gas supply—blamed in part on regional conflicts involving Ukraine—have added to the political unease. As Moldova positions itself toward the West, public discussions about national identity, regional stability, and the role of international conferences like this one have gained traction.

The "Making Europe Great Again" initiative brings together political thinkers who advocate for national sovereignty, secure borders, and self-reliant governance across Europe. While full details from the Moldova event are still forthcoming, Ferguson's presence points to growing momentum behind these principles, especially among those skeptical of overreach from supranational bodies and foreign influence.

As tensions remain high and Moldova navigates its future with Europe, voices like Ferguson's reflect a broader European movement seeking to reassert traditional values and local decision-making. More updates from the conference are expected in the coming days, as participants continue to outline their vision for a more secure and sovereign Europe.
