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Opposition APC Demands End to Engineered Politics

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At the All Parties Conference (APC) in Islamabad on July 31, 2025, Pakistan's opposition leaders united to demand the restoration of democracy, constitutional supremacy, and an end to alleged judicial victimisation and engineered politics.

On July 31, 2025, opposition leaders convened the All Parties Conference (APC) in Islamabad, organized by the Tehreek Tahafuz Ayeen-e-Pakistan (TTAP) alliance, to challenge what they call a manipulated political system undermining Pakistan's democracy. Senior figures, including Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) leaders Omar Ayub Khan and Asad Qaiser, alongside TTAP's Mustafa Nawaz Khokhar, condemned the ruling coalition's tactics, accusing it of orchestrating judicial victimisation to suppress dissent. "The goal is to restore true democracy through constitutional means," Khokhar declared,

as reported by Pakistan Today, emphasizing the APC's role as a platform for those oppressed by the current regime. The conference also criticized the sentencing of PTI protesters from a November 26, 2024, demonstration, per The Frontier Post.

The APC highlighted economic distress, with Khokhar noting that collapsing purchasing power and soaring inflation have crippled salaried workers, per The Express Tribune. Leaders demanded an end to "engineered politics," pointing to controversial Election Commission of Pakistan (ECP) decisions, such as reserved seat allocations, which Majlis Wahdat-e-Muslimeen (MWM) chief Allama Nasir Abbas called undemocratic, according to The Frontier Post. The conference, attended by representatives from PTI, MWM, and other opposition groups, rejected state repression, with TTAP chief Mahmood Khan Achakzai vowing a nationwide, non-violent movement from Gilgit-Baltistan to Gwadar, as reported by Pakistan Today. Achakzai stressed that the alliance seeks principled, constitutional solutions, not political theatrics.

Pakistan's \$350 billion economy hinges on political stability, and the opposition's push for democratic restoration reflects concerns over governance impacting investor confidence. The APC called for a neutral ECP and judicial independence, echoing historical movements like the Movement for the Restoration of Democracy (MRD) in 1981, which sought similar goals against military rule, per Dawn. Leaders urged peaceful protests on August 5, 2025, warning against government interference, per The Frontier Post. As the opposition mobilizes, the conference signals a critical juncture for Pakistan's political landscape, demanding accountability and fair elections to safeguard economic and democratic integrity.
