

India and Pakistan Compete in Symbolic Flagpole Rivalry at Border Crossing

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India and Pakistan have continued a symbolic display at the Attari-Wagah border involving tall national flags. This display follows a four-day military confrontation earlier in the year and reflects ongoing tensions between the two nuclear-armed neighbors.
