## Illegal Immigration Threatens Stability, Warns Former Senior Police Official

Illegal immigration is placing significant strain on Britain's public order and community stability, according to former senior police officer Kevin Hurley. Speaking in a segment featured on GB News titled *Twelve Months of Turmoil*, Hurley highlighted the growing impact of unlawful arrivals on national cohesion and security.

Hurley, who previously served as Head of Public Order for the City of London Police, urged immediate and decisive action. He warned that continued inaction could carry political consequences, stating that authorities should consider detaining illegal immigrants to prevent further disruption. "If don't do something quickly, they're finished... put them straight into detention camps," Hurley remarked, underlining the need for swift enforcement policies.

The warning comes amid rising concerns over illegal Channel crossings. According to official figures, nearly 42,000 people entered the United Kingdom illegally via small boats in the year ending June 2025, marking a 34 percent increase compared to the previous year. This surge has placed additional pressure on border control resources and intensified public scrutiny of immigration policy.

The GB News broadcast explored how these developments are affecting communities across the country. The programme pointed to a growing disconnect between local residents and government efforts to manage the situation, particularly in areas where unauthorised arrivals have overwhelmed existing infrastructure and services.

While the topic remains politically charged, Hurley's comments reflect growing concern among law enforcement veterans and community leaders who view the current rate of illegal immigration as unsustainable. The suggestion to implement controlled detention has sparked debate, but it also represents a call for clarity and stronger enforcement measures in managing border security.

Public dissatisfaction continues to mount, with opinion polls showing declining confidence in the government's ability to control the UK's borders. As pressure builds, officials may face increasing demands to deliver practical, enforceable solutions aimed at restoring public trust and order.
