Police Appeal to Find Missing Sans Souci Teenager

New South Wales police have issued a public appeal to locate a teenager who has been reported missing from the suburb of Sans Souci, Sydney.

The missing person is 16-year-old, last seen in the Sans Souci area. Authorities are concerned for their welfare and have urged anyone with information about their whereabouts to come forward.
