

Aviation Safety Body Directs Heightened Security at Airports Over Terror Threat



India's aviation safety body has mandated a significant increase in security measures at airports across the country, citing a potential terror threat. The advisory, issued by the Bureau of Civil Aviation Security (BCAS), follows intelligence reports from a central security agency indicating a specific and credible threat from a Pakistani terror group. The heightened alert will be in effect from September 22 to October 2.

The BCAS directive, which has been sent to all airports, airlines, and state police, calls for a multi-layered security response. All civil aviation installations, including airports, helipads, and cargo facilities, are to strengthen their security protocols. The advisory emphasizes the need for close coordination among stakeholders, including the Central Industrial Security Force (CISF), local police, and intelligence agencies, to ensure a unified and effective response. Any intelligence or alerts received must be relayed promptly to all relevant parties.

A key component of the new measures is a stricter focus on personnel and access control. The advisory mandates strict identification checks for all staff, contractors, and visitors entering airport premises. It also requires continuous monitoring of all CCTV systems to detect any suspicious activity. The directive aims to preemptively thwart any attempts by malicious actors to exploit vulnerabilities in the aviation system.

The timing of the threat, coinciding with the period between September 22 and October 2, has added to the urgency of the security directive. While the specific nature of the threat remains undisclosed, the advisory reflects a proactive approach by Indian security agencies to safeguard critical infrastructure and public safety.

The move underscores the ongoing security challenges in the region and the constant need for vigilance within the aviation sector. By implementing these measures, authorities hope to reassure the public while ensuring that all possible steps are taken to neutralize the potential threat. The directive from BCAS highlights a serious and timely concern, and the enhanced security will likely be visible to passengers as they travel during this period.
