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## Trump Shares Meme Targeting Obama Amid Treason Claims

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President Trump again targeted Barack Obama, posting a digitally altered image on Truth Social parodying the 1994 O.J. Simpson Bronco chase, with Obama in the vehicle and Trump and Vice President Vance depicted as pursuing officers.

Trump reposted an AI-generated video showing Obama being arrested in the Oval Office, set to the song "YMCA," with Obama handcuffed and escorted by law enforcement. Trump

captioned the post, "No one is above the law."

The post followed Director of National Intelligence Tulsi Gabbard's release of documents alleging a "treasonous conspiracy" by Obama-era officials to manipulate intelligence regarding Russian interference in the 2016 election, which she described as a "years—long coup" against Trump.

Obama's office, via spokesperson Patrick Rodenbush, called the allegations "bizarre" and "a weak attempt at distraction," referencing Trump's broader controversies, including the Epstein file issue.

Trump intensified his rhetoric by sharing the altered Bronco chase image, in which Obama is the driver and Trump and Vice President Vance are in pursuit, declaring to reporters, "It's there, he's guilty. This was treason."

Critics have questioned the Trump administration's handling of the Epstein issue; FBI and Justice Department investigations found no credible list of clients, yet Trump ordered the release of certain Epstein-related documents—motions for broader release have since been denied by federal judges.

Despite past associations with Epstein during the late 1990s and early 2000s, Trump has distanced himself from the disgraced financier and continues to call for transparency. Republican leaders have also urged further disclosures regarding the case.

Trump's online posts, including digitally manipulated content and public accusations, have raised concerns among commentators about political discourse and the role of social media in shaping public opinion.
